




The Christchurch Rudolf Steiner School is seeking donations of works of art for an art auction it is holding in association with its traditional Summer Fair to be held at the school on November 24.

The auction is part of a major appeal for funds to enable the school to complete the purchase of land in Christchurch to enable it to build a school on a permanent site. Established four years ago, the school currently rents premises but the school is growing so quickly a permanent site with room for expansion is urgently needed.

Rudolf Steiner schools (there are now four in New Zealand) are non-sectarian and both art and music are an integral part of a curriculum designed to enable children to become fully rounded and developed people. The school is not elitest and turns no children away, offering a dual fee system in which they can elect to pay a fixed termly fee or to pay what they can afford.

While we realise that all recognised artists plan well ahead for exhibitions of their work and for commissioned work we hope members may have something which they would be happy to donate for our auction.

BENSON & HEDGES ART AWARD 1980

For a notable painting or painted relief suitable for wall display

The awards

A cash award of \$3,500 will go to the artist entering the work which is considered by the appointed judge to have the greatest merit.

In addition, members of the public will be entitled to vote on the form provided in the official catalogue for the work (other than the outright winner) which they consider to have the greatest merit. A supplementary award of \$500 will go to the artist whose entry receives the highest number of popular votes during the course of the exhibition's New Zealand tour.

Entries

One work only may be submitted by each entrant. It must have been completed during a period of twelve months prior to 26 April, 1980. The submitted work must be original and must not have been previously exhibited publicly. There is no entrance fee.

Qualifications

Entrants must have been permanent residents of New Zealand for at least two years prior to 26 April, 1980 (temporary absences excepted), and must not be less than eighteen years of age at 26 April, 1980.


There is no restriction on subject matter or style in which the work may be executed.

Medium


Any work entered must be in one of the painting media. Reliefs, constructions and assemblages will be accepted provided that the medium of painting is an essential part of the work. All works must be suitable for wall display.

Murals


The C.S.A. Gallery has occasional requests from clients wishing to commission artists to proved murals or large works for the interior and exterior of commercial buildings.

It would be greatly appreciated if anyone with material pertaining to the history of the Canterbury Society of Arts would be willing to lend the Gallery anything they might consider to be useful.



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Shona McFarlane Retrospective Exhibition Preview 16th November at 8 pm The Exhibition closes 2 Dec

Shona McFarlane is very much a Dunedin artist. She has lived in the city most of her life, and has contributed much to it. Born in Gore, she spent her childhood in Lawrence, moving to Dunedin with her parents when she was ten.

Her career in art began at the Dunedin Teachers College, when she like a number of well known artists today who could not, or were then unable to undertake a full fine arts course, she did a 'third year' in art, a specialist course which produced some of the country's leading art educationalists, artists and craftsmen, among them people like Ralph Hotere, John Drawbridge, Marilyn Webb and Elizabeth Stevens.

After a couple of years in the Maniototo district as an itinerant art teacher, she went to London in 1953, and remained for over four years, teaching in schools for intellectuallys and physically handicapped by day, and taking evening classes at the Hammersmith School of Art most evenings.

She returned to Dunedin in 1958, and was surprised and excited by the character of the city which she had previously taken for granted. Her output during the years 1958-69 was prodigious, and the paintings and pen drawings from this period are already historic documentation of a city in change. She had given up teaching and joined the Dunedin Evening Star. Her next twelve years with the paper developed her interest in writing and lead to her rather rare combination of talents as writer and painter. Her reporting days also provided her with people and places to paint and produced some of her best genre painting. It also lead to more involvement in the community.

She became active in a number of arts organisations, was the first woman to be appointed to the Queen Elizabeth 11 Arts Council, became chairman of its visual arts committee and president of the Dunedin Civic Arts Council. She was awarded the MBE for her services to art and the community in 1973.

Then came a sudden halt to everything. Elizabeth Stevens comments: "In 1972, after surgery for cancer, Shona believed for a while that she would never paint again. Until a grey depressing day when someone brought her some oranges, and she decided without much enthusiasm to paint them. That was the trigger that released her second great burst of creative ability. An apparent misfortune became a catalyst for a complete change of lifestyle She left The Star and devoted her time to painting.

The following year, 1973, an exhibition of her 'painting and prose' was held in the Shona McFarlane Gallery of the Otago Art Society. Of the exhibition, John Middleditch wrote; "these new works are colourful and dynamic - they have quality of significant form - the aesthetic element that all artists strive for, but few achieve."

Her family have been recurring themes through the years, particularly her mother whom she painted many times.

Shona McFarlane has designed several glass windows, among them the huge 'Rainbow', a window mural for the Manukau City Centre in Auckland which was completed in 1976 and which measures 40ft by 13ft. She won the 1974 National Bank Art Award with "Sunflower" a glass and perspex panel which hangs in the Dowse Public Art Gallery in Lower Hutt.





In these I have also painted areas with lacquers and enamels.'

New Zealand School of Photography presents members and students major exhibition

This privately owned and operated institution situated in The Arts Centre, Christchurch provides tuition with emphasis on practical learning, in the taking, developing and printing of photography. Courses are available in both Colour and Black and White photography and in the two and half years of operation over 400 students from throughout N.Z., all walks of life and professions have availed themselves of the School's comprehensive facilities.

The aim of the School is to promote a better understanding in the art of photography and students are encouraged to participate in exhibiting their work.






David R. Turner

I have been involved with clay approximately, 12 years, constantly being fascinated by the extremes that is malleable material can be pushed to.

The past two years I have done very little clay work partly because I had a full time job and inspiration was low, however in May this year I resigned my position in order to further my career as a potter . . . but the Customs Department was also furthering its career by making hurdles for potters to try and get over. Because I had not been working and confidence was low the hurdle I faced seemed too large to get over - so I have snuck around the side of it.

Facts on gifts and bequests to the CSA

Over the past year we have come across a number of misconceptions regarding duties payable on gifts to such cultural and charitable bodies as the CSA.

These are the facts on gifts made during your lifetime: All gifts made to the CSA do not attract any payable gift duties whatsoever.

If you are a farmer, businessman, patron of the arts, recipient of a windfall, in the middle of a gifting programme to your family, even paying gift duties on your gifts — you can still give as much as you like to the CSA and:

the CSA gift will not affect your family gifts in any way;

the CSA gift will not attract any payable gift duty;

the CSA gift will be permanently excluded from your estate

for estate duty purposes.

These are the facts on bequests:

Bequests in a will to such cultural and charitable bodies as the CSA up to \$25,000 receive an exemption from estate duty. If total charitable bequests in a will exceed \$25,000 any excess over

\$25,000 attracts estate duty. The secretary would be happy to discuss in complete confidence,

any proposals which friends and donors to the Society may have at any time.
