
#### **CSA WORKING MEMBERS**





# **CRAFT SEEN**

"We select the people; you select the pieces" that is the basis on which the Craft Seen exhibition is organised. The 38 exhibitors were chosen by each other, and instead of a selection procedure, the craftspeople are given the responsibility of ensuring that only their best work is offered for display. It will all be new work, not exhibited in Christchurch before

This is the third annual Craft Seen exhibition. The first two used smaller gallery spaces at the CSA, but with so many exhibitors this year, the exhibition will be held in the Mair Gallery.

Crafts on display will cover the whole gamut from pottery and weaving through furniture, wrought iron, jewellery, fabric art, sculpture, woodturning and tapestry, to toymaking, quilting and musical instruments. Nearly all of the work will be for sale.

#### SEAN MCGARRY SIMPLY KOZMIK (A MIXED MEDIA EXPERIENCE)

"My art possesses both organic and alien qualities and colour is used to create dynamism and impact. Colour, texture and symbolism are prominent, as is dealing with the relationships of forms within themselves and the spaces they occupy.

I believe to create images that are abstracted, we must first face reality by developing our ideas through everyday interaction with the reality which surrounds us. I am constantly trying to achieve 'Visual Totality' within my work - the point where art finds harmony both in a visual and a mental sense.

#### POETRY READING

Christchurch poet Richard Whyte says of his work - "I am a social poet. My poetry is my diary. It tends to be introspective and is predominantly about feelings."

The programme for his latest reading will last approximately 30 minutes and feature mainly new works, written over the five years since his last public reading. Mr Whyte supports his writing by teaching speech and drama. He has given poetry readings at the Robert McDougall Art Gallery as well as the CSA. Mr Whyte's poetry has been published by the South Island Writers' Association, as well as in "Cue", the Speech Communication Association magazine, and he reads his work regularly over Radio Plains.
